#### **Rotary's Fifth Avenue of Service**



In 1949, the Rotary International Board adopted the slogan "Every Rotarian an Example to Youth" as an expression of commitment to children and youth in each community in which Rotary clubs exist. Serving young people has long been an important part of the Rotary program.

New Generations Service, the newest Avenue of Service, created by the 2010 Council on Legislation of Rotary International on April 28, 2010, recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.

Youth service projects take many forms around the world. Rotarians sponsor Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, athletic teams, centres for disabled children, school safety patrols, summer camps, orphanages, recreation areas, safe driving clinics, county fairs, child-care centres, and children's hospitals. Many clubs provide vocational counselling, establish youth employment programs, and promote the use of The 4-Way Test. Increasingly, drug/alcohol abuse prevention and AIDS awareness projects are being supported by Rotarians.

It is the responsibility of each Rotarian to prepare the New Generations - all young people up to the age of 30 - by improving their life skills to ensure a better future, while recognising the diversity of their needs. All clubs and districts are encouraged to undertake projects that support the fundamental needs of the New Generations: health, human values, education, and self-development.



It's been a massive month of April for the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN), and its organisers. Firstly with the second year of RYPEN Sunraysia, held at the picturesque location of Lake Cullulleraine. Secondly, the completion of two concurrently run RYPEN Metro programs held at Woodhouse activity centre in Piccadilly.

RYPEN has been widely successful, engaging over 90 participants across all three programs. Credit must be given to its organisers including Administrative personnel, Damian leach, and Stephany Martin along with lead directors, Tyler Lawrence, Liz Gardner and Jenna Casey. However, the success of RYPEN could not have been ascertained without the tireless effort of its directors and secretaries, giving up their spare time to create a program that inspires young people to become great leaders.

Across all three programs, participants engaged in educational sessions designed to include elements of fun and games making it a weekend full of camp laughter instead of boring lecture and seminars.

From motivational speaking to problem solving, theatre and confidence, issues forums, career advice and public speaking the participants engaged in numerous activities that allows them to grow in their leadership abilities, while also opening their minds to new ideas and concepts.

One of the most incredible elements of the weekend to witness is the coming together of strangers and their leaving with newly formed friendships and a sense of family. RYPEN not only teachers young people to become great leaders; it also gives them the opportunity to make new connections and broaden their horizons.

Each RYPEN program is held once a year in the April school holidays and caters for young people aged between 14 and 17 years old. RYPEN is a fantastic opportunity to become engaged paving the way for future community involvement.

#### Global Grant 1641312

**Trevor McGuirk** (Unley) has returned from **Cusco**, **Peru** having successfully initiated a Rotary Medical Health care project for Isolated communities – **Ttio Grande** is certainly isolated. From Cusco the journey to Ttio took 2 and half hours ever climbing up into the snow peaked mountains. There were 9 in the van including Trevor, two registered nurses and a dentist and it was loaded up with medical equipment required for the Health Fair – medical supplies, blood testing units, height measuring stand and weighing scales health programmes for local communities. The classroom at the school was set up with 7 stations. Children in groups of 10 rotated from each station every 30 mins - blood tests, general eye sight test, dental care, clean water and caring for the



environment, leadership, and children's rights, antibiotics, followed by height and weight measurements. Girls over 12 years were given a vaccination injection against rubella. All data of each child recorded onto a data base. Each child given a "health passport" which is kept at the school for the next check-up in 4 months' time.

#### Frankston's successful approach to membership

The Rotary Club of Frankston has increased its membership, thanks to clever planning, an enthusiastic team and some 'out of the box' thinking. In the past twenty months the club in District 9820 has increased its members from 39 to 64.

According to current President Grahame Gordon the membership initiative was essential for the club's survival. "From a high of 85 active members in the mid-1980s, numbers had declined to 39 at the beginning of the 2014-2015 Rotary year. Effective club management was becoming difficult" he said.

It was at this point that then club President John Wright identified increasing membership as the club's number one priority. He pulled together a team of five carefully chosen Rotarians and charged them with the task of increasing the club's numbers.

As part of their initial planning, the membership team conducted a survey of current and past members, then set about acting on the survey findings. They modernised some meeting protocols, strengthened the club's social program, and re-invented the club's image with smart new Rotary apparel.

The team also developed new membership materials, including a prospectus showcasing the positive nature of the club; its achievements in the local community, fundraising activities and active social program. The prospectus was accompanied by a 15 minute DVD which reinforced the message.

According to Mr Gordon, success of the membership initiative was due largely to some 'out of the box' thinking. "Our survey highlighted that cost was an emerging issue, so we decided to offer new members a fee-waiver for their first year. This definitely made joining easier" he said. The fee-free period gave new members time to build their loyalty to the club. "Despite initial concerns from existing members, I'm pleased to report that 100% of new members went on to pay their annual dues at the beginning of their

second year" he added. The club also separated the identification of new prospects, from the actual direct contact.

"We knew a lot of members weren't comfortable approaching friends and

business contacts, so we established a team of three members who were willing and able to follow up the leads. But we made every single member nominate at least one new prospective member" Mr Gordon said.

According to Mr Gordon, gaining membership buy-in was absolutely essential. "There were some very strong debates in the beginning, and times when we wondered whether we'd receive the club's support. However, in the end, members realised we needed to grow the club – for everybody's benefit".

Frankston's membership initiative continues well beyond induction. Each new member is assigned a mentor and the club holds informal evenings so new members can learn more about Rotary. Within their first three months, each new member gives a 'who am I' talk to the club.

The success of the club's membership initiative has exceeded everyone's expectations. With 25 new members the club has been revitalised, and the entire membership of 64 is looking forwards to a strong and vibrant future. "In the end it made us realise what a great club we actually have" Mr Gordon stated.


# Central Blue Mountains Rotary Dee-Why Warringah Rotary TRF Centennial Souvenir Stamp Sheet

The stamps are legal Australia Post issue and able to be removed and used on mail items; they are common postage stamps on offer and do not contain any souvenir images or logos.
