Helping Vulnerable High School Students Achieve Happy, Productive and Worthwhile Futures

The Rotary Club of **Encounter Bay** has nominated an innovative Wilderness Therapy Expedition for students at Victor Harbor High School's Flexible Learning Options (FLO) as its **Signature Project for 2016-17.**

The Club has provided support to FLO over many years, including funding for the purchase of new computers. Assistance has also been given to encourage students to attend the very successful local **Roadsafe Youth Driving Awareness** program which is run by the club.

The FLO program is going from strength to strength under the guidance of Team Leader, Jenny Vonic-Joyce and is now attracting a great deal of attention from other schools and communities throughout Australia as a result of its excellent student outcomes.

Early in October 2016, students from FLO will be taking part in the 14-day Wilderness Therapy Expedition which, while similar to South Australia's long-standing Operation Flinders program, is instead run on a therapeutic base. The expedition leader, Will Dobud, is a young American who has successfully worked for many years with disadvantaged young people in remote areas of Canada and Alaska.





His approach focuses on relationships, trust, collaboration and creativity.

The students selected for the expedition have all experienced significant trauma in their young lives and the primary aim of the program is to assist them to build the resilience they need to overcome many of the barriers they now face.

This is a first for Australia. The Wilderness Therapy Program has never before been facilitated in this country, in this format, and the Rotary Club of Encounter Bay is very proud to be able to assist Victor Harbor High School's FLO to get it up and running, and provide the opportunity for students to participate.

The wellbeing and resilience of the students at FLO is a priority for Jenny Vonic-Joyce, and our club will continue to support her and the students whenever possible.

Rotary Club of Noarlunga East International Project Tonga Ambulance

On 11 October 2016 at a special meeting of the Rotary Club of Noarlunga East held at St Francis Winery in Old Reynella, representatives of the Tongan Community of South Australia gathered with representatives of the Rotary Clubs of Noarlunga East, Coromandel Valley, Noarlunga, Hallet Cove, and the SA Ambulance Service, to farewell the ambulance that is being donated to the people of Tonga. All those present wished the ambulance safe and excellent service to the people of Tonga. Whilst the Rotary Clubs of Blackwood, Campbelltown and Tailem Bend also provided financial assistance to the project, and they are thanked for their involvement with the project, they were unable to attend the special event.

The project to provide an ambulance to the island nation is now nearly complete after numerous periods of excitement and disappointment over the course of the project. The vehicle was purchased thanks to the generosity of the above Rotary Clubs and converted into an ambulance with the conversion and refurbishment thanks to the SA Ambulance Service fleet workshop staff. The SA Ambulance Service fleet workshop employees donated their own time working on the preparation of the vehicle as a fully functioning ambulance. The project has been fortunate enough to have had three stretchers donated, and sign writing provided at cost.

The vehicle is being packed in a shipping container on 12 November at **Donations in Kind** (DIK).



Supplies of other medical and health provisions sought by the Tongan people are to be packed with the ambulance.

The project is thankful to the Rotary Club of **Noarlunga** which has agreed to the meet the DIK costs.

The special night finished with a young representative of the Tongan community performing a traditional dance that expressed thanks and happiness to Rotary and the SA Ambulance Service. Representatives of the SA Ambulance Service who have been involved in the project informed the meeting that the delivery of the ambulance to Tonga will be excellent timing as their existing ambulance is now over 10 years old and past its "use by date".

The President of the Rotary Club of Noarlunga East, Raelene Donnell wishes to thank everyone who has been involved with the project over the last few years.

Self Assessment for Tax purposes

HOUSEKEEPING

Each year Rotary Clubs are <u>required</u> by the ATO to self assess their position for Tax purposes and determining whether they are an Exempt Entity. Whilst the task sounds onerous it is relatively simple and should not concern clubs unduly.

The form can be sent to clubs or downloaded from the ATO website and completed by either the Treasurer or Secretary and tabled at the club Board meeting to be recorded in the minutes.

Most clubs will be assessed as Exempt Entity and hence do not require to lodge a tax return.

If a club is in doubt as to their particular situation then District Treasurer Bruce strongly recommends contacting a Tax Adviser.

October 16

A man was badly burnt after a barbeque gas cylinder exploded, melting the roof and shattering the windows of a Toongabbie townhouse a suburb of Sydney. Fire and Rescue New South Wales has recorded a massive spike in the number of LP gas explosions, with eight in the past week alone. With the weather warming up, firefighters are urging all home owners to take just a few minutes to check barbeques, leads and gas bottles to ensure all equipment is safe and in good working order.



During winter, BBQs sit unused on the verandahs or in the sheds at properties. So often, when spring comes around, appliances are re-lit to feed family gatherings or other parties. Without simple precautions being taken it can be a recipe for disaster. Did you know that while your BBQ is sitting idle over the winter months, things can go wrong? Here are some examples and what you can do about them.

Insects and other bugs can make their home in the burners restricting their proper functioning! What should I do? Carefully clean the burners externally with a wire brush. Clean the inside of each burner with a venture brush. If the burners are removable, wash them under a tap and allow to dry before reinstating.

The on/off controls are tight or cease functioning correctly! What should I do? This is specialist work and should only be undertaken by a licenced or registered plumber/gasfitter WHAT IS LPG? LPG is an essential fuel for BBQs and other outdoor appliances, but it can be dangerous if not treated properly. LPG is a combination of hydrocarbon gases such as propane and butane. LPG is stored as a liquid under pressure.

Generally, refillable cylinders contain propane, disposable cylinders contain butane. LPG is colourless but has a strong characteristic smell which makes it easy to detect. Because it is heavier than air, LPG collects in low places and may not disperse easily or quickly. It is highly inflammable and easily ignited. LPG is not poisonous but breathing high concentrations will cause vomiting, headaches and nausea. Gas escapes can lead to explosions and fires.

SAFETY TIPS

Follow these general safety tips – Keep BBQs in good condition, and have them serviced regularly – Ensure hose/pipe connections are in good condition, unblocked and fit snugly – Use only parts (such as hoses) that are designed for LPG - Never use home-made BBQs or connections – If gas fails to light properly, turn off the supply and leave for three minutes to allow unburnt gas to disperse Always ensure adequate ventilation when using LPG appliances - Gas cylinders should not be left on the transit hook when a BBQ is in use - Never disconnect a cylinder without checking that it is turned off - When reconnecting



or exchanging a cylinder, check that the rubber O ring, if fitted, is in position. – Check for leaks with a soapy water solution (never use a match) – if bubbles form, there is a leak. Better still, call in an expert – If there is a fire extinguisher or a fire blanket at the property, check they are available in an emergency – Dispose of out-dated or empty cylinders responsibly – Ensure location of cylinder is below portable BBQs – Store LPG cylinders outside, upright and away from sources of heat – When transporting LPG cylinders, store them in a secure, upright position And remember it is dangerous to be in charge of a BBQ after drinking too much alcohol.

I have connected to my gas cylinder and have found a small gas leak when testing with soapy water!

What should I do? Turn off the gas at the cylinder, disconnect the POL and check the faces are clean. Most small leaks occur due to misalignment so take care when assembling and reconnecting the POL (Check connections for leaks with soapy water using a small (15 mm) brush to apply)

The hoses connecting the gas cylinder and the BBQ deteriorate and split.

What should I do? Replace worn or leaking hoses with a new product that is designed for Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG). The important "o" ring which is found on many POL connections, between the hose assembly and gas cylinder, is damaged. What should I do? Replace the connection with new. The checks that must be made to ensure the safe operation of BBQs are so important it is advisable to engage an expert – a licenced gasfitter – to conduct the checks and carry out any maintenance or repairs which are needed. It's important for your peace of mind.
